Chapter 3

The Biblical Archetype - King Saul and the Religious Narcissist

From "Navigating Marriage to a Christian Narcissist" by RC Blakes, Jr and "The Narcissist's Dilemma" by Kris Reece.

RC Blakes, Jr identifies King Saul as the perfect biblical portrait of the religious narcissist. Saul was chosen, anointed, and used by God - yet his deep insecurity and need for human approval ultimately undid him. When Samuel confronted him, Saul's first concern was not his sin before God but his reputation before the people (1 Samuel 15:30). This is the hallmark: the fear of man rather than the fear of God.

The Christian narcissist may have genuine spiritual experiences. They can be truly called and anointed. But their heart remains oriented toward human approval rather than divine transformation.

Kris Reece asks: can a narcissist be a true Christian? Her answer is the fruit test (Galatians 5). The question is not whether someone made a profession of faith, but whether the fruit of the Spirit is growing in their life. A narcissist may have "the form of godliness" but deny its power (2 Timothy 3:5).

Chapter 4

The Covert Religious Narcissist

From "The Covert Religious Narcissist" by Shaneen Megji.

Shaneen Megji describes the most dangerous figure in the church: the person who has mastered Christian vocabulary without having a Christian heart. They can pray eloquently, quote Scripture, hold ministry positions, and give counsel - all while using these activities to feed their need for admiration and control.

Key traits of the covert religious narcissist: 1) They use spiritual language to avoid accountability - "the Lord told me," "you are touching the Lord's anointed." 2) They create a public persona of humility while demanding special treatment. 3) They interpret all criticism as spiritual attack. 4) They collect people who depend on them as unwitting enablers. 5) Their public spirituality contrasts starkly with private coldness and abuse.

Healing begins when the victim trusts their own observation over the narcissist's spiritual rhetoric. "By their fruits ye shall know them" (Matthew 7:20).

Chapter 5

Marriage to a Narcissist - Boundaries and Survival

From Dr. David Hawkins, Marriage Helper, and Coach Liliya Labonte.

A crucial distinction: a difficult spouse can receive feedback, apologize, and change. A narcissist cannot. The narcissist has constructed a false self that must be protected at all costs. Any feedback threatening this false self is met with rage, withdrawal, or manipulation.

Marriage Helper distinguishes between narcissistic traits and full NPD. The label matters less than whether the relationship is healthy.

Coach Liliya Labonte focuses on female narcissists who use relational aggression, victimhood, and emotional manipulation rather than overt dominance.

Practical takeaways: 1) Boundaries are for protection, not punishment. 2) Consistency is essential - every time you give in, you train them that boundaries are negotiable. 3) Document everything. 4) Seek outside support - isolation is their weapon. 5) Accept that you cannot fix them.

Chapter 6

Identity in Christ - The Foundation

From "God's Comfort for Wives in Narcissistic Marriages" by Unsealed Scripture (18 refs).

The largest document emphasizes one truth: before any strategy, you must be rooted in who God says you are. A narcissist will try to define you, diminish you, and dictate your worth. But your identity is not negotiable.

Key scriptures: Romans 8:1 - no condemnation in Christ. 2 Corinthians 5:17 - a new creation. Ephesians 1:4-5 - chosen before the foundation. 1 Peter 2:9 - a chosen generation.

When your identity is secure in Christ, the narcissist's words lose their power. Spiritual warfare against narcissistic abuse is won not by fighting the narcissist but by standing firm in who God says you are.

Chapter 7

Divine Justice - God Sees and Will Act

God is not blind to narcissistic abuse. Eight scriptures build the case: God sees every injustice, knows every hidden cruelty, and will act in His time. This is not a call to passive endurance but to active trust.

The victim does not need to become the avenger. Vengeance belongs to the Lord. He will repay (Romans 12:19). This truth frees the wounded believer from the exhausting burden of trying to make the narcissist see what they have done.

"Shall not the Judge of all the earth do right?" (Genesis 18:25).

Chapter 8

Healing and Deliverance

From "Healing From Narcissistic Relationships" by Mark DeJesus, "From Bondage to Deliverance" by Iyabo Oyawale, and "Married to Deception" by Secrets of God's Kingdom.

Mark DeJesus makes the essential point: healing does not begin when the narcissist changes but when you stop trying to change them and establish firm boundaries. The narcissist needs supply (admiration, control, validation). Boundaries cut off the supply - this is why they resist so fiercely.

Iyabo Oyawale's personal testimony reminds us there is life after narcissistic abuse. She walked through the darkness, found her footing in Scripture, and emerged not bitter but free. The contrast between real love (1 Corinthians 13) and its counterfeit was her framework.

Married to Deception cites 20 verified scriptures. The central theme: deception thrives in darkness but withers in light. Bringing narcissistic patterns into the light - through truth-telling, trusted counsel, and Scripture - is how freedom begins.

Chapter 9

Ten Warning Signs of a Narcissistic Spouse

From "When the Mirror Breaks: Narcissism and the Christian" by Coach Liliya Labonte.

The ten warning signs: 1) Lack of genuine empathy - inability to truly feel for others. 2) Inability to receive correction - any feedback is met with rage or withdrawal. 3) Entitlement - belief that they deserve special treatment. 4) Exploitation of others - using people without regard for their wellbeing. 5) Need for constant admiration - they require a steady supply of praise. 6) Grandiose sense of self-importance - exaggerated achievements and talents. 7) Belief they are special and unique - can only be understood by special people. 8) Interpersonal exploitation - taking advantage of others to achieve their own ends. 9) Lack of accountability - refusing to take responsibility. 10) Patterns of deception - lying, gaslighting, and manipulation.

These signs are not a checklist to condemn but a grid for discernment. No one displays all ten all the time. But a consistent pattern across multiple areas is cause for serious concern.

Chapter 10

Going No Contact — What the Narcissist Hopes Will Happen

Going No Contact: What the Narcissist Hopes Will Happen

One of the most difficult but necessary steps in dealing with a narcissist is going no contact — cutting off all communication. The Common Ego channel explains the psychological dynamics.

WHAT THE NARCISSIST HOPES WHEN YOU GO NO CONTACT:

1. That you will break first. The narcissist expects your need for closure, guilt, or loneliness will drive you back. Every day you stay silent is a test of your resolve.
2. That you will doubt yourself. Without their constant input, you wonder: "Was it really that bad?" This self-doubt is exactly what they are counting on.
3. That you will come back begging. Your no contact cuts off their supply of admiration and control. They believe you will eventually return seeking their approval.
4. That they can find a new source and make you jealous. They quickly find new supply and hope this will drive you back.

WHY NO CONTACT WORKS: The narcissists power over you exists only in the relationship. When you remove yourself, you remove their access to you. Without access, their manipulation has no target.

BIBLICAL PERSPECTIVE: Proverbs 22:24-25 warns against friendship with an angry man. 1 Corinthians 15:33: "Evil communications corrupt good manners." Matthew 18:17 shows that when someone will not listen, we treat them differently. Separation is not unloving when a relationship is consistently destructive.
